Beech Class - Autumn 2024



Dear Parents and Carers,

Welcome to Beech Class 2024-2025! We hope you have all had a wonderful summer holiday time. We've already got some fantastic learning lined up for the year ahead.

Our topic for the first half term is *Tools for Change*. During this time we will be focusing our history on the *Changes in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age*. This links in nicely with our science work which is all about rocks and understanding how different types of rocks are formed. We will also be using this topic to explore how to use basic tools in art to create some wonderful work inspired by Wassily Kandinsky. We have already started to enjoy *Stig of the Dump* in our reading for pleasure sessions and will soon begin reading *24 Hours in the Stone Age* as part of our comprehension work. In French, we are starting the year by understanding some basic French phonics before moving on to learning about musical instruments and how to use the verb "jouer" (to play). Excitingly, this term, all children in Key Stage 2 will be learning the recorder with West Sussex Music.

In the second half term our topic is *Bending and Meandering*. During this unit, our geography work will focus on the journey a river takes. In design and technology we will be learning how to fold paper effectively to create some wonderful pop-up books. As part of our science, we will be learning how sound travels and how it is created. We will be learning about the seasons in French and using this to help us construct a short sentence using a conjunction.

We are also currently working on some very exciting enrichment activities including a class trip. More about this soon!



Reading

Reading is the backbone of our learning and good reading skills support the children in nearly every other aspect of their work. For this reason, we are keen to ensure the children read both in school and at home as regularly as possible. We expect the children to have both their reading book and their homework diary in school every day. We

have asked the children to read at home a minimum of 3 times a week, for which they will be rewarded with house points. We ask that an adult signs the purple homework diary each time your child has read. Homework diaries will be checked for this on a Wednesday.

At school, the children will have the opportunity to use the library on a Friday.

In class, all children will be involved in whole class guided reading. Those children who require extra support with their decoding will have further reading sessions with an adult each week.

Targets / Next steps



Your children will be set targets over the coming weeks, based upon our teacher judgements as well as the assessments they are completing currently. They will be given a target for maths and literacy. We shall look forward to sharing these with you at our parents' evening in October.



Each week, the children will take part in a whole class spelling lesson where we will discuss a new spelling pattern or set of spellings. The children will then be set a task on Emile to further reinforce this learning and give them the opportunity to practise these spellings again at home. We will also give the children a list of the week's spellings in the front of the children's purple homework diaries.

Child specific spelling support

Emile is a very clever app because the more your child plays, the more the app learns about your child's spelling ability. This means that any spelling games your child plays, beyond the weekly spelling task set, will be tailored to your child's ability. The app will aim to reinforce any spellings gaps in your child's learning and then challenge them to improve at the appropriate level. More detail on using Emile is provided in an accompanying letter, attached.

Maths / Multiplication Tables

Times table practice is hugely important when it comes to success in maths. We have found Time Table Rockstars to be an excellent app to encourage the children to practise. Each child has their

login details in the front of their purple homework diary. For ease, the login details for TT Rockstars and Emile are the same. Children will have a weekly session to practise on TT Rockstars at school, but we do encourage them to play at home on a weekly basis as well. Achievements on TTRS will be celebrated in our Acorn Assemblies on a Friday morning and their achievement celebrated on the TTRS display in the hall.

Homework

In order to best prepare the children for Chestnut class and their continued school journey, each week, we will set the children a short piece of either maths or English homework. This will be set on a Wednesday and will be due for the following Wednesday. Most weeks, homework will be set as a task on Emile. The children will receive house points for successfully completing their homework on time. We do not intend for homework to be overly arduous for the children and it shouldn't be taking more than 30 minutes. If your child is finding their homework challenging for whatever reason, please don't hesitate to let us know so we can support them with this.

Google Classroom

Beech Class will have its own Google Classroom. Setting up our Google Classroom will form part of our computing lessons over the next few weeks. The children will be logging in and getting to grips with navigating and using Google Classroom in class. Once everything is established, we will be inviting children to log in at home too.

Forest School

- Please name all clothes, especially waterproofs, as these all look very similar.

Mrs Pierron will be teaching the class on Mondays, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. Mrs Anstee will take over the reins on Wednesday afternoons, Thursdays and Fridays. The children will be supported in class by Miss Scott.

Whole class recorder lessons provided by West Sussex Music will commence on Tuesday 17th September up until Christmas.
